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Re-Awakening the Dream & the Journey

Dreamtalk 話夢 by Ranice Tay & Ang Gey Pin and other shows from the postponed NUS Arts Festival 2020 transformed for the virtual stage.

Singapore, 20 August 2020 — You are warmly welcome to be part of a journey of discovery when the virtual theatre curtain rises on Dreamtalk 話夢 presented by NUS Centre For the Arts on 4 & 5 September.

Dreamtalk 話夢 unfolds in a house of shapeless things, where everything is born and everything wanes. Here, a dreamer is half-asleep, and a rousing guardian stands watch. A journey is waiting in the shadows. Organically blending movement, text and song, Dreamtalk 話夢 is indeed a quest to confront the transience of living as the dreamers whisper "Are you willing to 'see' beyond physical sight? Will you resist, or can you surrender to the flow of life? Are you truly awake, or are we all just passing-by in a dream?"

Originally scheduled as part of the cancelled NUS Arts Festival 2020: Ways of Seeing, Dreamtalk 話夢 is a practice-as-research project to explore the transformative potential of an actor's body. Created collaboratively by NUS Performing Visual Arts Scholar, Ranice Tay, and the seasoned theatre pioneer, Ang Gey Pin through various phases of development, the current iteration with the talents of spatial designer, Kow Xiao Jun will be an intimate online theatre experience that invites you to embrace your inner world even as the external world seems changed beyond recognition. Tickets at \$15 or \$10 (Pay-as-you-wish) are available from SISTIC. Post show dialogues will follow performances.

Besides Dreamtalk 話夢, Blindspot by NUS Chinese Drama directed by Judy Ngo has been reworked for online presentation on 8 October in conjunction with World Sight Day. Films such as John Krasinsky's A Quiet Place, Josh Oppenheimer's An Act of Killing and Makoto Shinkai's Weathering With You have been scheduled for September 2020 as part of the ExxonMobil Campus Concert Series. Finally, NUS Ilsa Tari's exploration of issues concerning women in dance, Layaran Sukma will be presented in January 2021 preceded by a symposium in December organised by the Department of Malay Studies, Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences. 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Annex A: About the Creatives

Ang Gey Pin

Ang Gey Pin (pedagogue, director and actress), is best known locally for her title role in The Silly Little Girl and The Funny Old Tree (1987). She began her apprenticeship with Practice Theatre Ensemble in 1986, and was the artistic director (1995-1998) of Theatre OX. She performed lead roles and toured with the Workcenter of Jerzy Grotowski and Thomas Richards, Italy (1994/1998-2006) on Project The Bridge: developing theatre arts. Ang initiated Sourcing Within (since 2006), comprising of research and work sessions in embodied practice in performing arts and anthropology. A recipient of NAC Young Artist Award (1999), she holds a PhD Drama by Practice-as-Research (University of Kent, UK).

Ranice Tay

Ranice Tay is a NUS Performing & Visual Arts Scholar (2015 – 2019) at the National University of Singapore, where she graduated with an Honours (Distinction) in Theatre Studies. As a performer, creator and voyager of the wilderness within, Ranice has worked both locally and abroad, collaborating avidly with Sourcing Within on embodied practice. She has performed in A Mouthful of Birds (World-In-Theatre), The Silly Little Girl and The Funny Old Tree (Young People's Performing Arts Ensemble), and Benches (Poetry Festival Singapore). More recently, Ranice's encounters with the Workcenter of Jerzy Grotowski and Thomas Richards, has led to intensive work on dramaturgy, voice, and performance craft, through masterclasses in Pontedera, Italy and Beijing, China.
